
Fall Engage Magazine


Advent Retreat for Pastors and Ministry Leaders

Faculty Updates



Dr. Haddon Robinson, third President of Denver Seminary, passed away on July 22. His memorial service was held on September 7. A recording of this service can be accessed here.

Dr. Robinson was recognized as one of the most gifted preachers and communicators in the country. Under his leadership Denver Seminary became one of the most financially and academically stable evangelical institutions in the United States. Among other significant endeavors during his presidency, our institution's name changed to "Denver Seminary", women were added to the teaching faculty and board of trustees, and the DMin program was expanded significantly. His influence on Denver Seminary, our community, and the global Church was great.


Our own Dr. Scott Wenig, Haddon Robinson Chair of Biblical Preaching, wrote a beautiful tribute to this great man, which can be found here.

How do you continue to find God as dementia pulls your loved one into the darkness? Nothing is simple for a person suffering from dementia, and for those they love. When ordinary tasks of communication, such as using a phone, become complex, then difficult, and then impossible, isolation becomes inevitable. Helping becomes excruciating. In these pages philosopher Douglas Groothuis offers a window into his experience of caring for his wife as a rare form of dementia ravages her once-brilliant

mind and eliminates her once-stellar verbal acuity. Mixing personal narrative with spiritual insight, he captures moments of lament as well as philosophical and theological reflection.


Dr. Groothuis also authored ten entries in *The Dictionary of Christianity and Science*, published by Zondervan this year.

Dr. David Buschart served on the drafting committee of a recently published Protestant confessional statement, The Reforming Catholic Confession. The RCC is a broadly and diversely Protestant statement of faith, intended to celebrate the Reformation by setting forth a fresh, positive, and unifying expression of Protestant Christian belief.

Dr. William J. Evans, BD 1966

An update from Dr. Howard Culbertson, DMin 1986

I started working on my DMin in missions in the early 1980s when we were in Italy as missionaries. I did my on-campus work during a year of home assignment. Then, our mission board asked us to transfer to Haiti. That is where I finished up my work, including the project.

That DMin opened the door for me to teach missions at Southern Nazarene University during a year of home assignment in 1988-89. That one year turned into 25 years of teaching missiology at SNU. While I was there, two other Nazarene institutions -- Nazarene Bible College in Colorado Springs and Northwest Nazarene University in Idaho -- asked to me to begin teaching two or three online courses in missions each year for them. After my retirement four years ago, Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City approached me about teaching one online course in missions each year for them.

Without the doctoral degree in missions, none of these opportunities for teaching would have opened up for me. Teaching was never in my thoughts about how God's call to be an expatriate missionary would play out in my life. I entered the Denver Seminary DMin program with the goal of being the best possible cross-cultural field missionary. However, that degree opened up some opportunities and when schools came knocking at my door, I felt the Lord's blessing and even nudge to accept.
